#### Reflecting on 10 Years Together



It's hard for me to believe that we have been together as priest and parish for a decade. Where has the time gone? And looking at our family pictures from when we arrived at St. Andrew's in August 2015, this feeling only gets more pronounced! Our girls are no longer kids, but young women who are discovering themselves and making their own ways in this complicated and beautiful world. St. Andrew's has a palpable sense of thriving and not just surviving. And my hair is somewhat thinner and *a lot* grayer (which I don't think is due to either the kids or the parish - just life).

How is it that we have arrived - as a family and parish - where we are now? I think the most basic answer is that we have put in some significant time together as Rector and congregation. But more significantly, I think it's that we've covered some ground in this journey of life, faith and ministry. We've put in some miles together.

In the Fall of 2015, we had a Celebration of New Ministry, which is a beautiful rite of passage marking the beginning of a new pastor/congregation relationship. (It's much better than the old term for this - "Installation" - which sounds like the priest is an appliance or piece of furniture that is being bolted into the church!) There is a poetic line in this service which always stands out to me, where the Bishop (or Dean) charges us to cultivate "the bonds of affection" which will allow us to be faithful and fruitful in ministry together. I firmly believe that it is these very "bonds of affection" that have allowed us to not only survive 10 years together, but to actually thrive. Put another way, we have grown to love one another.

One of the things I loved about St. Andrew's when I arrived is your genuine spirit of welcome. Most churches claim to be welcoming. In my experience, few really are. Our ethos of welcome is, I believe, a charism (gift of the Holy Spirit) of this parish. You sense it when you walk in, before experiencing very much. And that sense of welcome is confirmed throughout a church service and beyond.

From the minute I arrived at St. Andrew's, I felt that I was welcome here. Not just welcome in a generic sense, but welcomed into your midst to be fully who I am and who I am becoming, both as a person and a priest. Part of our journey together has been solidifying our identity as a welcoming congregation and building upon that cornerstone of our parish life. To feel truly welcome is an affirmation to all of us, and a healing balm to many who have not felt welcome in other parts of their lives, especially in religious places or spaces. It is one way we reflect Jesus' Way of Love, otherwise known as the kingdom of God.

I want you to know that I know you love me. That feels a little weird to write, but I know it to be true. The visible manifestation of these "bonds of affection" at the surprise 10th Anniversary Coffee Hour you threw for me a couple weeks ago was deeply meaningful and a bit overwhelming. It's not often I am rendered speechless, and it happened that day. It is not a given (sadly) that a parish will deeply love their clergy, and be willing to express it. I feel like the luckiest priest in the Diocese, having a parish that I know loves me. Your love is a big part of what sustains me in the challenges and joys of parish ministry. Thank you.

And I hope you know that I love you, too. I love the whole of St. Andrew's, and I also love the individual people that comprise St. Andrew's. Like any relationship of love, we drive each other a little crazy sometimes, and I'm sure rub each other the wrong way on occasion. But that goes with the territory of a relationship of love. I think that's the meaning of what the Scriptures tell us, that "Love covers a multitude of sins." If there was never any friction, that would be merely infatuation, which admittedly is a lot of fun, but not very deep, lasting, or ultimately satisfying.

As we mark our 10 years together as priest and parish, let's continue to name and celebrate these "bonds of affection" that describe our relationship. I believe they are God-given, and they are key to our common life together. To name them is an act of gratitude, thanks and praise, and increases our "joy quotient", as Bishop Paula is fond of saying.

Indeed, may all who encounter St. Andrew's know that we are Christians - followers of Jesus' Way of Love - because we love one another.

Two parishioners who have formerly served on Vestry at St. Andrew's or another Episcopal church, two current or former Vestry members, and the Wardens and Rector will comprise the committee. Thank you to current Vestry member, John

Toussaint, and outgoing Vestry member, Matt Andrews, who have already volunteered. The committee will be commissioned by the Vestry at the September meeting, so if you are interested in serving on this short-term committee – or are interested in being included on the slate of Vestry or Convention Delegate candidates in 2026 -- please let us know.

There is a lot going on this month as we leave our laid-back summer pace behind. Please be sure to watch the weekly bulletins and church calendar for up-to-date information. Also don't forget to make time each day to pray, study, and thank God for the many blessings in our lives and in our church. There are several opportunities other than weekly worship to do so in groups at St. Andrews -- such as in Centering Prayer, Women's Bible Study, Brotherhood of St. Andrews, Daughters of the King, and Children's and Adult Forum classes. #### **AUGUST VESTRY MEETING REPORT**

On Aug. 21, 2025 the Vestry met for its August meeting. Highlights follow:

- 1. Outreach Update: Janine Pickett and Laura Holm reported on recent progress of the Outreach Committee. They're analyzing the responses from committee heads to their recent survey. Based on this analysis, Janine and Laura will finalize the survey they plan to circulate to all parishioners. Laura recently submitted applications to renew the Parish Partner grants awarded by the Episcopal Charities of the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago. These grants help with funding for our feeding ministries specifically Sandwich Board and Community Kitchen. Fr. Gregg reported on interest from the Church of the Holy Nativity to join us on the youth trip Mother Tara is leading to Casa Hogar next Summer; youth from both parishes will travel together to Casa Hogar next Summer under Mother Tara's leadership.
- 2. Stewardship Update: Bob Sellinger updated the Vestry on the detailed plans for the upcoming stewardship campaign and shared a calendar of weekly stewardship activities scheduled between St. Andrews Day on Sept 7th and Celebration Sunday in early November. See the Crosscurrents Stewardship article for more details.

- 3. Parking Lot Liability: As a follow up to an action item from last month's Vestry meeting, Neil Cleary reported that he discussed the liability implications of the use of the church's parking lot by four staff members of a local dental office with our insurance representative. Our agent assured Neil that we're covered our policy covers any liability associated with this use. The Vestry agreed to close this action item.
- 4. Leadership Recruiting Committee Commissioning: Fr. Gregg reminded the Vestry that it's time to form a recruiting committee to identify candidates to fill the Vestry and Warden positions that are maturing. Matt Andrews and John Toussaint volunteered to be the two Vestry members on this committee. Matt and John will join the Wardens, Fr. Gregg, and two other parishioners not currently on the Vestry to form the recruiting committee. All members of this committee will be identified by the Sept. Vestry meeting for the Vestry's approval.
- 5. Fund Raising Policy Update: Malinda Hamann shared a fundraising policy draft for the Vestry to review. The goal of this policy is to insure all fundraising activities conform to state law, particularly concerning sales tax. Malinda plans to update this draft with the Vestry's comments and will have an updated policy statement for the Vestry to consider in Sept.
- 6. July Financial Report: Mike Dunn presented the July financial report. The favorable trends we've seen since the start of the year continued through July our revenue continues ahead of plan while our expenses continue below what we forecasted in the budget. Based on the meetings Mike's had with the PDO director and the analysis he's done of PDO finances (particularly the increase from \$45 to \$50/day/child that becomes effective this Fall), Mike expects PDO's Fall financial performance to break even. The Vestry approved the July financial report and concurred with Mike's assessment of PDO's finances.

#### **STEWARDSHIP 2025**

Our annual stewardship campaign starts on St. Andrews Day, Sept 7th. The format should be familiar - same theme, "We Are Called", as last year; familiar hymns; weekly bulletin updates of our progress; our follow-the-ushers tradition; and a Celebration Sunday pie pot luck.

This year you'll notice increased involvement of parishioners throughout the campaign. Over the next two months, you'll hear from a number of parishioners about why they love St. Andrews and how they participate in stewardship. You'll notice the active involvement of our youngest members in the campaign. You'll also read the weekly bulletin updates of our progress to meeting our goals - 5% revenue growth, 95%+ parishioner participation, and involvement of the newest members of our church.

Meeting our stewardship financial goals is particularly important this year. With a successful campaign, we'll be able to finally erase the deficit in our budget. Entering 2026 without a deficit would be the culmination of the financial roadmap we've been following over the last four years. We're almost there; it's now up to us to realize this goal.

However, numbers and money aren't the message of stewardship. After all, numbers dwell in our heads while stewardship starts in our hearts as a way to respond to God's unconditional love for us. God calls us in many ways to participate in the life of the St. Andrews' community; taking care of our church through stewardship is one of those ways. Over the next few weeks, take a few moments to reflect upon what St. Andrews means to you, what your callings are, and what your heart is telling you about stewardship.

Another one of the ways we can show our pride and love for our church is participating in the upcoming St. Andrews' apparel drive. On Sept. 7th, thanks to the Daughters of the King and Brotherhood of St. Andrews, you'll have the opportunity to order St. Andrews's themed apparel and merchandise. It's been over 10 years since merchandise like this has been available - it's long overdue and finally here.

As a faith filled, loving community, we have much to be proud of and thankful for here at St. Andrews. Through stewardship we have the opportunity to demonstrate our pride and respond to God's unconditional love for us.

#### **HOSPITALITY UPDATE**




#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

#### ST. LUCIA GUILD






#### **Talking Across the Divide:**

Whether we're debating online, arguing with a relative at Thanksgiving, or working toward social change, the arguments that resonate so well with like-minded allies don't hold much weight with people on "the other side." At a time when a simple conversation can quickly turn into a battlefield, it's up to us to learn how to talk to one another again.

We'll take five Wednesdays, September 24

-October 22, to discuss Justin Lee's book *Talking Across the Divide*. Lee is a social activist, who has spent years building bridges between conservatives and progressives. He reveals how to use empathy, storytelling, and strategic dialogue to break through barriers that make people resistant to differing views. 

## **YOUTH GROUP MISSION TRIP** with Church of the Holy Nativity

In late July, Mother Tara took several St. Andrew's students for a weeklong trip into downtown Chicago to learn and work on issues of environmental justice. Our youth group joined students and leaders from Church of the Holy Nativity, Clarendon Hills and Trinity Episcopal Church, Asheville, North Carolina, on a mission with Be The Neighbor, a national youth-mission organization founded by the United Church of Christ. Our group slept on air mattresses in the basement of the Broadway United Methodist Church and went out on adventures each day from the home base near Wrigley Field.

The first day we went to the Field Museum to learn about the indigenous peoples of the Midwest. That afternoon we took time to pray and meditate on the lake shore. Next, we took a "Toxic Tour" of the Altgeld Gardens neighborhood on the far South side of the city and learned how toxic waste dumps and other pollutants are systematically concentrated in areas with large minority populations and low economic resources. The pollution leads to many other adverse health factors, such as high rates of asthma, cancer, and pregnancy complications. After that we spent a very hot afternoon pulling weeds and spreading mulch at A Just Harvest in the Rogers Park neighborhood. A Just Harvest is a multifaceted neighborhood organization that runs a community kitchen with daily free meals, food pantry, wellness center, and community gardens. (Find out more at: https://ajustharvest.org) The next day, we visited the "Wild Mile" on the Chicago River, a shoreline restoration project by Urban Rivers that has brought back many native animal species to the Chicago River, including otters and beavers! We also got to go on the Architectural Boat Tour to learn about the history of the river and the efforts to clean it of pollution.

Now we're excited to bring all that we learned back to our community! Our students made a video about their plans to continue caring for God's creation, and it's posted on the St. Andrew's and Episcopal Diocese of Chicago Facebook pages. Check it out! St. Andrew's 6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders will be partnering with CHN teens for monthly youth group meetings, social events, and another mission trip next summer to Casa Hogar near Puebla, Mexico.

#### **PUMPKIN PATCH NEWS**

Last year we co-sponsored a Pumpkin Partch Fundraiser with the Church of the Holy Nativity (CHN) in Clarendon Hills. It was the first Pumpkin Patch Fundraiser for both of our churches. Many great things came about from this event that enriched the lives of those less fortunate than many of us:




- We sold about 600 pumpkins that enabled us to donate almost \$800 to Casa Hogar as well additional financial contributions to PADS, and a local FISH pantry by CHN.
- Additionally, the pumpkins we purchased benefited the Navajo nation.
- Pumpkins were purchased and donated to PADS for 45 children to turn into Jack-O-Lanterns.
- Approximately 100 pie pumpkins were delivered to FISH food pantry for food insecure people
- Kurt delivered small pie pumpkins to a senior home to help the residents celebrate and enjoy Halloween
- Mother Tara and Rachael, the Children's Ministry Director at CHN, connected and were able to combine our small but growing teenage groups to do a mission trip in Chicago and are hoping to have a mission trip with the teenagers to Casa Hogar next year. Please see Mother Tara's article in our newsletter for more information on the mission trips.

This year we are more experienced and will implement what we learned last year. Some of our expenses were for reusable items, signs, costumes, and banners so we will have less expenses this year. Additionally, our supplier is confident this year's sales will be even higher, and they will be sending more pumpkins to us this year.

We are looking for someone to research environmentally friendly ways to dispose of unsold pumpkins and bales of straw. Zoos, stables, and farmers with animals who eat pumpkins or straw are places that may welcome free food. If you know of anyone or would be interested helping with pumpkin disposal, please contact Kathy Seidler or Dave Howland.

Be sure to watch for additional updates as the time approaches.





You may have noticed you've been hearing a lot lately about our neighbor, the Church of the Holy Nativity, and that's because we are partnering with CHN on a host of great adventures in the months to come. We have been working with CHN for years on Interim Housing Center (Dupage PADS) ministry, and we share Deacon Rose with CHN, too. Last year we joined forces for the pumpkin patch fundraiser, which was tons of fun, and this past summer our youth went on a mission trip together.

We had so much fun together that Rachel Snavely (youth formation director at CHN) and I decided to fully merge our youth group programs (6<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> graders) for the 2025-26 school year. Each month, we will host one youth event at St. Andrew's, and CHN will host one youth event there. And we are already planning another joint summer mission trip in 2026 to Casa Hogar in Mexico.

The future of the Episcopal Church (and all Christian denominations) is collaboration between parishes. Sharing resources, knowledge, and building broader community benefits us all. It's so much fun to get to our neighbors in the next town over, and together we can do so much more! We hope to see you at the pumpkin patch this fall, especially at the chili cook-off on October 25<sup>th</sup>, which will be a fundraiser for the 2026 summer mission trip.
