Don't Let The News Consume You

Something I hear frequently - and by that, I mean almost daily - is that many people feel overwhelmed by everything that is going on in our nation and in the world. In particular, many people are feeling overwhelmed by the seemingly intractable polarization in national politics, and the vitriolic rhetoric that accompanies it. The manifestations of this feeling of overwhelm are many; anger and rage,



anxiety, depression, hopelessness, fear, and temptation toward despair. Sometimes it seems to be a struggle just to get through the day with all the news coming at us, let alone the worry of what might be coming tomorrow. And all this is in addition to the "normal" worries we all carry about health, family, friends, and various life situations that impact us personally. It's easy to feel like we are on a hamster wheel that someone is constantly shifting into a higher gear. It's hard to keep up.

We live in an information-saturated world. The amount of information available to us or coming at us keeps growing exponentially, and shows no signs of slowing down. The problem is that this information saturation has outstripped our human capacity to absorb it, both in terms of amount and speed. We simply can't adapt or evolve fast enough. Is there anything we can do? Or is it inevitable that we either give in to despair, or burn out trying to keep up?

Thankfully, I think we have other options. We have agency. We don't have to allow ourselves to be victimized and traumatized by the 24-hour news cycle. We have choice.

I think the key is to admit to ourselves that there really is no such thing as "keeping up." There is just to much. But that doesn't mean we need to stick our heads in the sand, either. We can instead practice establishing boundaries around our news consumption - when, what, and how much.

I wanted to share some insights from a very helpful article I received from SamaraCare Counseling, written by one of their counselors. She refers to setting these boundaries as "Mindful News Consumption," and offers the following definition of mindfulness: "Paying attention to what is going on inside you and around you in the present moment." She goes on to offer the following strategies for mindful news consumption:*

- 1. Check in with yourself first. This allows us to see if we have the capacity to take in new information at the present time. It's OK to say, "Not right now." You can wait until you are in a better space the news will still be there.
- 2. **Pick one or two topics you are passionate about.** We can't keep up with everything it's impossible. So limit your focus to things that especially align with your values.
- 3. **Set time boundaries.** Instead of allowing yourself to "doom-scroll" endless news feeds (or watch an excessive amount of cable news programs), allow yourself a brief period of time, or limit your news intake to certain times of the day. Set a timer to help you stick to your boundaries.
- 4. Choose reading over scrolling or watching. Social media feeds and provocative commentary are designed to trigger emotions that's what keeps you scrolling or watching. Reading allows you to control the pace, and gives you space to check in with yourself.
- 5. **Refill yourself after consuming news.** Take a little walk, go outside, call a friend, listen to music do something that you enjoy. It will give you a chance to reset yourself and to attend to your day.

I find these tips to be very practical, helpful, and doable. And I know from experience that this mindful approach works, and helps me to manage my own feelings of overwhelm and anxiety. It's important for me to take care of myself - not to be self-indulgent, but I can't really care for others around me unless I care for myself, too. It's like the airlines say: "Put your own oxygen mask on first before helping others."

In Philippians 4:8, the Apostle Paul encourages the fledgling church in Philippi, "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing, whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things." For context, he probably wrote these words from prison - he had plenty of things to be anxious and worried about. He had a lot of first-hand experience living in a chaotic political world. He wasn't advocating ignoring, denying, or avoiding the world - he just knew he couldn't let the world consume his mind and heart. He had the ability to choose where he allowed his mind and heart to dwell. And so do we.

NEWS FROM THE WARDENS – OCTOBER 2025



Among the many blessings we experience here at St. Andrew's is the opportunity to participate in the many activities enriching our church, our community, and our individual lives. Take a look at the church calendar and you'll find many ways to get involved. Later in this Crosscurrents you can read updates on our feeding ministries (particularly news about Community Kitchen and Sandwich Board), about ways to participate in the upcoming Pumpkin Patch, and about a Medicare seminar where Tom Haberkorn will answer your questions and share with us the latest news about this important program.

Another important activity we're in the midst of is our annual Stewardship campaign. As a self-sustaining church, St. Andrew's financial health is dependent on parishioners' pledges for over 90% of our annual income. Meeting our Stewardship goals allows us to continue as the faith-filled community we all love.

While the pledge card you've recently received looks a lot like last year's pledge card, there's one important addition. At the very bottom of the card, you'll notice a box to check if you've included, or plan to include, St. Andrew's in your will or estate plans. This type of financial support is often referred to as planned giving. While pledges help us meet our near-term, annual budget needs, planned giving enables the church to build a solid financial foundation that insures our church's long-term financial health; pledges and planned giving are complementary ways to help St. Andrew's.

St. Andrew's is blessed with a generous history of planned giving, the best example being the planned giving of Charles A. Young. Over 50 years ago, Charles A. Young, a prominent parishioner and local merchant, created an estate plan that both insured the financial security he and his wife enjoyed for the rest of their lives and also created a financial legacy for St. Andrew's. While Charles predeceased his wife, when his wife passed in 1983, his estate plan established the Charles A. Young trust that the Youngs then gifted to St. Andrew's. Today, when you read about St. Andrew's Endowment Funds, you'll see prominent mention of the CAY (for Charles A. Young) Trust which accounts for over 40% of St. Andrew's Endowment Funds. Since 1983, the CAY Trust, while continuing to grow in value, has annually contributed thousands of dollars that directly benefit St. Andrew's. While Mr. Young is no longer with us, his financial legacy will continue to live on benefiting the church his family loved.

Over the next few months expect to hear more about planned giving and how it works to the benefit of each of us and our church. In the meantime, if you've included or plan to include St. Andrew's in your will or estate plan, please let us know by simply checking the box at the bottom of your card. We won't ask, and never will ask, for any more details about your long-term financial plans.

October is often one of the best months of the year. Enjoy the many blessings of this month by partaking in all the activities here at St. Andrew's.



VESTRY HIGHLIGHTS – SEPTEMBER 2025

Vestry met on Thursday, September 18, 2025, to discuss the business of the parish. Nine members were present, as well as the Senior Warden, Junior Warden, and Treasurer.

The Outreach Committee, led by Laura Holm and Janine Pickett, reported that the Outreach Survey has had approximately 25 responses so far. They will have laptops at coffee hour this week to encourage people to fill out the survey at that time. Gracia Morton reported that notification from the Diocese of Chicago was received on September 18 that continued a Parish Partner Grant for St. Andrew's Community Kitchen in the amount of \$1,720.00, and a new grant for St. Andrew's Sandwich Board program in the amount of \$1,365.00 for 2026. Laura Holm wrote the successful grant applications and is to be commended for her effort. The Diocese of Chicago will host the Episcopal Charities Autumn Soiree on October 10, 2025, at 7:00 p.m., which raises funds to support these grants. All vestry members and parishioners are invited to attend. Details on the fund raiser can be found at www.episcopalcharities.org.

The Leadership Recruiting Committee was commissioned to recruit members in good standing of the parish to be candidates for the positions of Warden, Vestry member, and Delegate to the Diocesan Convention in 2026. The committee consists of the following parishioners: Gracia Morton, Robert Sellinger, Fr. Gregg Morris, John Toussaint, Matt Andrews, and Kurt Wiesner.

An Emergency Plan is needed for the church and the Parents Day Out program. Efforts began a few years ago and a committee was put in place, but additional action is needed. Jacob Osojnak and Fr. Gregg will work on this project with any former committee members who are interested in continuing this work.

Mother Tara has taken over a large part of the duties of the Children's Ministry Director position (vacated in the spring by Anne Nelsen) and Amy Smith is serving as the Assistant Children's Ministry Director. There is no negative effect on the budget as a result.

Malinda Hamann and Gary Robbins of the Policy Committee moved for the Vestry to approve a Fundraising Policy to coordinate any fundraisers for which tickets or items will be sold, pursuant to Illinois Administrative Code Title 86, Chapter 1, Section 130.2005. Adherence to the policy will ensure the church remains exempt from collecting sales tax. The written policy was approved as amended. Gary Robbins will contact Dellana to have the amended Fundraising Policy be made a part of the Policy and Bilaws document of the church, and to provide a copy of the new Fundraising Policy to all committee chairs.

United Thank Offering (UTO) Fall Ingathering October 5, 2025

On Sunday, October 5, St. Andrew's will have our Fall UTO Ingathering at both services. The United Thank Offering (UTO) is a ministry of The Episcopal Church which began in 1883 when the women of the church took up a thank offering to support innovative mission and ministry in The Episcopal Church and Anglican Communion that the church budget could not cover.

Through the UTO program, parishioners are invited to embrace and deepen a personal daily spiritual discipline of **gratitude**. UTO encourages people to notice the good things that happen daily, to give thanks to God for those blessings and to make an offering for each blessing.

All funds (100%) collected through these thank offerings are gathered with offerings from across the country to provide grants to parishes and to social service agencies connected to the Episcopal Church and Provinces of the Anglican Communion. Since its official founding in 1889, UTO has awarded 5,475 grants for a total of \$145,318,512.13.

St. Andrew's participates in two ingatherings per year and through our parish's generosity, we send \$600-\$700 from each ingathering to support this important mission of the church. **Our Spring ingathering raised \$698.19.**

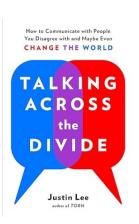
NEW ADULT FORUM

PASTORAL CARE CORNER
