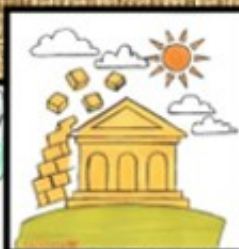
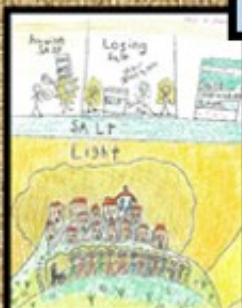

What Will You Do with the Winter Blahs?

As I sit writing this, we are in for a polar vortex over the next few days that will send the daily **high** temperatures below zero. That just seems *wrong* - a “high” that’s a negative number! But then again - it’s Chicago, and it’s January. For those of us who have lived here a while, we should know to expect the deep-freeze as a periodic reality during winter. And there is absolutely nothing we can do to change it - it just happens. It’s that time of year for the Winter Blahs.



Yes, I get a case of the Winter Blahs every year about this time. Many people I know do, too. It’s natural, I think. And by *natural*, I mean that it is part of the reality of the rhythms of our natural world. As one of my favorite Christmas hymns recalls, “In the bleak mid-winter / frosty wind made moan / earth stood hard as iron / water like a stone” (*Hymnal 1982, #112*). The earth and the whole natural world seems to pull into itself and hunker down for a spell. And that hunkering-down time is actually resting and renewing the earth for the frenetic explosion of growth that happens every spring. It is a necessary pulling-in that fuels the bursting-forth. Could it be that there is wisdom there for us as the human part of the natural world? I wonder.

Maybe we can take some time during this bleak “mid-winter” for our own renewal, of sorts - a turning inward. In our very production-oriented and externally-focused culture, this is in some ways counterintuitive for us. And perhaps, for some of us, it feels uncomfortable or scary, because it is something we don’t often practice. I’ve known lots of people in my life who don’t like to be “left alone with their own thoughts”, and there can be very good reasons for this sometimes - past trauma, depression/ anxiety, guilt or shame or regret for things that have happened. We are complicated people, all of us. So some of us - myself included - need to be a bit cautious and mindful about how we turn inward, and what we do. In other words, it’s good to have resources when going into unfamiliar or scary territory. So, I can share a couple of resources I am using during this season of turning inward, as examples. I’m certainly not saying these are “one size fits all,” but they are my experience, and I share it in hopes that it may give others some ideas for embarking on this hunkering-down project.

For me, this reflective posture is not an all-day, every-day enterprise. I don't spend *all* my time looking inward. If I did, I suspect that I'd not get out of bed until mid-March! I do, though, try to take some extra time each day for inward reflection. I say "extra" time in this sense, because I try (and don't always succeed) to spend some "quiet time" each day in prayer, reflection, and meditation. It's just that right now, during this natural period of hunkering down into oneself, I am trying to spend a little extra time doing this than I might during the other seasons of the year. It's a way of slowing myself down a bit.

I am also reading a wonderful book during this season by John Philip Newell entitled *Sacred Earth, Sacred Soul: Celtic Wisdom for Reawakening to What Our Souls Know and Healing the World* (which, by the way, was my gift to the St. Andrew's Staff this Christmas). I love his idea, which comes from Celtic wisdom and tradition, that our souls already *know* how to be in relationship with God - it's just that we have become disconnected in many ways from our own souls and this soul-wisdom. So it's not so much learning how to be in relationship with God as it is *remembering or discovering* what our soul already knows. Wow! It's the kind of book that you can read and digest little bits of at a time, which makes it ideal for a daily practice. And the subject matter deals with looking into ourselves, so it seems ideal for this season.

So, my answer to "what will I do with the Winter Blahs?" is to go with the natural flow of this season, but with some guardrails as I mentioned above. The discreetly set-aside times and the book are helping give necessary structure to my inward journey. I hope these small examples from my experience can jump-start your own creativity on what might work for you. The "bleak mid-winter" is here, whether we like it or not. We might as well see what it has to teach us, and we might well be surprised!

DID YOU KNOW?

Feeding Ministries are a major part of St. Andrew's' Outreach Programs and symbolize our devotion to serving those in need in our communities. The following highlights the scope of this work and the impact St. Andrew's made in our community in 2025:

Sandwich Board - in 2025 we made and distributed over 4300 bag lunches to Trinity in Aurora. Each lunch contains a ham and cheese sandwich, a bag of chips, a piece of fruit and a cookie as well as the mayo and mustard for the sandwich. There is a new signup sheet in the Gathering Space every month.

Community Kitchen - every Friday night we typically serve over 40 home cooked meals to the homeless and shelter deprived in our area; every Sunday afternoon, we serve another 15 meals to those looking for a hearty lunch. Funding for this ministry comes from volunteer donations and the Episcopal Charities of the Chicago Episcopal Diocese.

Thanksgiving Dinner - a St. Andrew's tradition. We prepare over 290 pounds of turkey, 90 pounds of ham and serve over 100 diners in-person as well as provide over 320 carryout meals. In total we serve Thanksgiving dinner to over 380 individuals from throughout the area. This is a huge effort involving over 90 volunteers -both parishioners and friends of St. Andrew's.

Christmas Dinner - on Christmas Day we prepared and distributed over 200 home cooked meals to those in need in our area.

FISH - we donated almost 2500 pounds of food and personal care items for the Downers Grove FISH pantry to distribute

While this is only a partial list, it represents the deep commitment St. Andrew's has to following Jesus in serving our neighbors in need. It's important to note that not one of these programs is funded by our operating budget. Every hour worked and every dollar spent is provided by a volunteer - both parishioners and friends of St. Andrew's - devoted to serving those in need in our communities.

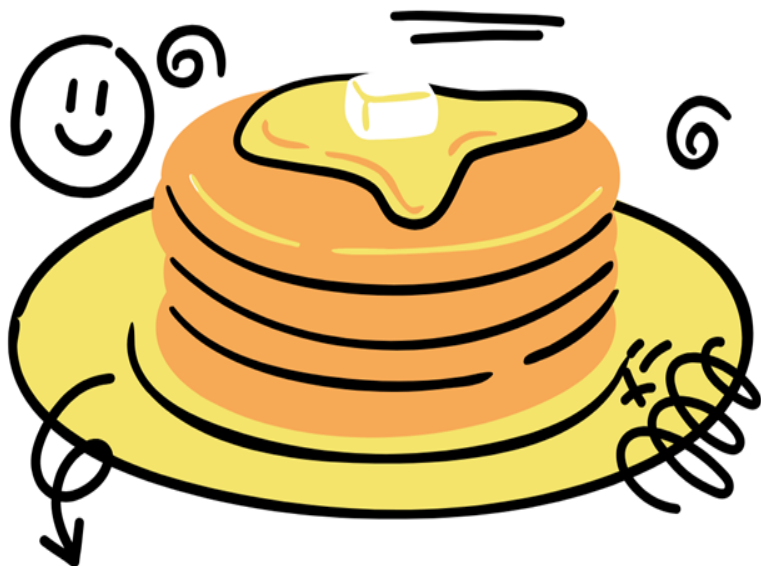

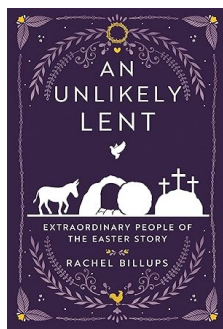


ADULT FORUM FOR LENT

YOUTH MUSIC AND CHOIR AT ST. ANDREW'S

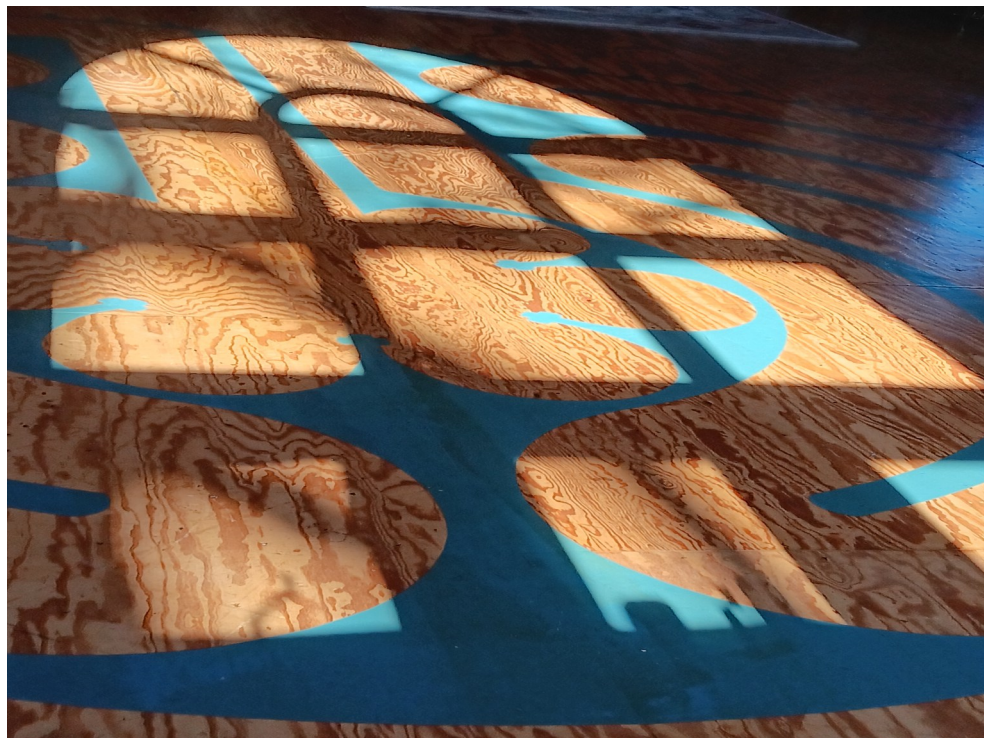

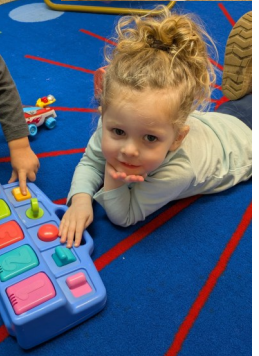
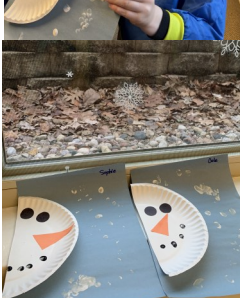
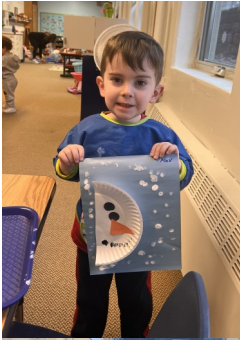


St. Andrew's PDO kids stay warm with cozy mittens by the campfire

Chilly winter temperatures inspired our recent craft choices at Parents' Day Out (PDO). Children created a snowman, handprint mitten, campfire and fuzzy hat craft. The children also spent some time exploring with colors through easel painting with tempera paint. We are now starting to work on a variety of Valentine-themed crafts.

The PDO children spend about an hour each day running around, playing games, and riding toy cars and bikes in the Parish Hall. This is a great way for them to have fun and be active, and is especially helpful in winter months when they tend to spend less time playing outside.

Now that we are halfway through the school year, we are already thinking about enrollment for the fall. Registration for the 2026-27 school year will begin for returning PDO families in March and will open up to new families in April. More details about registration will be provided in the March newsletter.



WHO WAS CATHERINE E. MORSE?

St. Andrew's began as a chartered mission of the Episcopal Diocese of Chicago around 1880. A "new" stone church was built on Franklin St. in 1897. As a mission parish, St. Andrew's was not fully self-supporting, and relied on part-time or supply clergy. Parish status was not gained until 1945, 65 years after its founding!

Catherine Elizabeth Dukat was born in Dublin, Ireland in 1826 and later followed her brother Arthur to America around 1870. Arthur was a successful businessman and purchased an 800-acre estate in the area that is now Avery Coonley school and portions of Denburn Woods and Gilbert Park. She later married Dr. Daniel Morse and became a member of the St. Andrew's mission parish. Catherine, as she eventually became to be known as Kate, was a Charter Member of the St. Andrew's Ladies Guild in late 1890's. In those days the women of the church were the prime fundraisers. As such the Guild was instrumental in paying for many things for the Church, including part of the Rector's salary. Money raised by the Guild was kept in a teacup in one of the lady's China cabinets. The all-male Vestry, as was the custom in those days, at one point demanded that the proceeds from the women's fundraisers should be given to the Vestry to be accounted for. The ladies politely and firmly refused. So, when the church was short of funds, the Vestry had to go hand-in-hand to the Women's Guild and ask for money in order to pay the Rector. Following Kate's death in 1903, C. P. Anderson, Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church the Diocese of Chicago, received a letter from Northern Trust Bank, as the Trustees of the will of Catherine E Morse, the sum of \$2000. As instructed, the earnings from this money were to be applied "towards the salary of the Minister-in-Charge of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church, Downers Grove".

Kate's gift of \$2000 in 1907 is the equivalent of \$80,000 in today's dollars! Each year since 1907 St. Andrew's has benefitted from her bequest and additionally her gift has now grown to nearly \$300,000. Also, dividends from the Catherine Morse trust, totaling over \$9,000, were applied toward St. Andrew's 2025 operating budget.

Earlier this year we spoke of Charles A. Young and the overwhelming benefit received by our church with his generosity in 1983. The story of Catherine E. Morse is equally astonishing in its support for the on-going mission of St. Andrew's.

In the coming months the St. Andrew's Endowment Committee will be sharing early thoughts with the parish to establish a Legacy Society to promote planned giving. Undoubtedly, we have our first two Charter members, Catherine E. Morse and Charles A. Young! If you think one person can't make a difference, remember these two individuals and their on-going support to our parish.
