

#### PALM SUNDAY

Holy Week is arguably the most important week of the Christian year. It is the week that culminates our Lenten season, and invites us to walk with Jesus from his triumphal entry in Jerusalem, through the Last Supper with his disciples, to his crucifixion and death, and to the silence of the tomb. That silence is shattered by the joyous celebration of God raising Jesus from the dead on Easter Day.

Palm Sunday begins the journey we walk with Christ through Holy Week. I have always felt that The Sunday of the Passion: Palm Sunday gives me a bit of "whiplash" – we are exclaiming "Hosanna!" one moment and "Crucify him!" the next. In order to more fully celebrate both Palm Sunday and The Passion we are separating them in time and celebrating them in the order in which they occur in the story of the life of Jesus.

Today's celebration will be dedicated fully to Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem as the Messiah, God's Chosen One. The Liturgies of the Palms, the Word and the Table all will focus on Christ being exalted as King of Kings. (*The Passion, read dramatically, will be the centerpiece of our Solemn Good Friday Liturgy.*)

The worship services in our parish throughout this week highlight important elements of the story of the last week in the life of Jesus and the beginning of our new life in him brought about by his death and resurrection. I encourage you not to miss one chapter of this life-changing and life-giving story!



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The Holy Gospel Mark 10:46-11:11

Deacon or Celebrant The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark.

They came to Jericho. As he and his disciples and a large crowd were leaving Jericho, Bartimaeus son of Timaeus, a blind beggar, was sitting by the roadside. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout out and say, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" Many sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he cried out even more loudly, "Son of David, have mercy on me!" Jesus stood still and said, "Call him here." And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way.

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting,

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.




# **SANDWICH BOARD**

Fr. Gregg has said "We are the church that feeds people". We are pleased to say that the Sandwich Board ministry at Trinity Episcopal in Aurora has been feeding people lunch every Thursday for over 35 years, people who come in need of food. St. Andrew's has been working with Trinity in this ministry all that time, providing food once every month, and our congregation has been funding it. Recently there has been an increase in cost and in the number of recipients, an average of over 425 lunches given out weekly at Trinity.

The St. Andrew's Sandwich Board Team has graciously been covering one half the cost of these monthly lunches. The other half has been provided by individual contributions from our congregation. Over all, it costs us about \$3.00 to make a nutritious lunch, a bargain compared to a burger, fries and soft drink meal at McDonalds.


